

#### **Rear Commodore**



Despite cancellations particularly at the beginning of the season, and some mid-race abandonments later on, the Tower Team have enjoyed some good racing, fine weather and of course the best of views, all whilst staying dry. Several times this season the races were also enlivened by the presence of dolphins. Our particular thanks to Jonka for manning the radio during the latter part of the season. It has been very good to have him back, and I am sure that the tractor drivers have appreciated the tips coming over the loudspeaker system.

We would also thank the sailing master Stewart (and his able deputies when not there) for setting up the races clearly and concisely, making our job an awful lot easier. The sailing master having a radio whilst on his Melges has been a great innovation this year in changing the course between races whilst necessary.

We would always encourage volunteers in the Tower - there is always someone to show you the ropes (and there are fewer ropes than on an actual boat) and no experience, sailing or otherwise, is necessary. The proof was in the pudding (of which he has had many). Some outstanding individual results and a spectacular team


effort had obviously been driven by our stirring Glorious Leader.

### Quiz night / January 6th, 2024


